Flagstaff Hill

The first phase of the Flagstaff Hill restoration project was completed on July 12. This phase of the project included restoring the stone entry steps, retaining walls, and the overlooking terrace on top of the hill. Carnegie Mellon University recently completed construction of the hardscape at the East Entrance (corner of Tech and Frew Street). PPC will plant out the West and East Entry Gardens during the fall and spring planting seasons.

Hartzell Monument

The Hartzell Monument restoration is complete! The monument is located on the corner of Federal and North Avenue in Allegheny Commons Park, so don't forget to stop by and see this newly restored piece of Pittsburgh History!

Allegheny Commons Segment B

Segment B of the North Promenade design work is scheduled to begin this fall, with an estimated construction start date of Summer 2023.

FEC Sensory Classroom

PPC received a grant from the Edith Trees Foundation to design an outdoor sensory classroom at the Frick Environmental Center. The design portion of the project will be wrapped up by July 2023.



Park Waters

Erin recently attended the One Water Summit in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, as part of a delegation made up of stakeholders in the water world in Pittsburgh to brainstorm and discuss stormwater solutions. The team is also scheduling watershed walks and fall clean-ups in our priority watersheds.

Parks Rx

September brought a variety of programs related to our Parks Rx initiative, including a Baby & Me Nature Walk with Children's Hospital Hello Baby Program, the Final Hazelwood Family Center program at Hazelwood Green Plaza, and another incredible Walk with a Doc event! In addition, the team is also planning a park prescription research study with Stanford University Natural Capital Project.

Forest Therapy Guide Certification

Patty, Shawn and Kathryn are halfway through their 6-month Forest Therapy certification class. Multiple forest bathing programs are scheduled this fall with a variety of partners including Carnegie Mellon University, Azure Pittsburgh, 10.27 Healing Partnership, and Highmark Caring Place.



Summer Camp Recap

This summer, we served 254 campers ages 4-13. We also worked with 11 outstanding teens in our Young Naturalists summer internship program and an additional 8 "younger teens" in the inaugural year of our Summer Stewards program for middle schoolers.

Partnering with Local Families

In collaboration with the community engagement team, the Ed Team worked with children and families in the Hill District, Homewood, and Hazelwood. Highlights included an outing to Schenley Park with campers from the Schenley Heights Child Care Center, a day trip to Moraine State Park with Hazelwood families, and regular interactions within each neighborhood.

Back to School!

We try to see each of the approximately 1,200 PreK-12 grade students enrolled in our school partner programs for their initial visit before mid-November. This school year, we'll hold an afterschool Outdoors Club program in three schools and work with teachers to develop robust suites of sustainability lessons featuring the FEC and its data dashboard


It's Spooky Season!
